During World War II a certain city church in London was all set to celebrate their annual harvest Thanksgiving festival. Everyone in the church had already brought their "first fruits" from their gardens and farms and had placed them in the sanctuary – and in the center of those gifts stood a sheaf of corn. The service was never held, however, because on that Saturday night there was an air raid and the church was destroyed by bombs.

The congregation was devastated, but then something unexpected happened. On the bomb site where the church once stood there appeared some shoots of green in the spring. All through the summer those shoots grew until they were harvested as corn in the fall. Not even the bombs and the ruins could kill the life of the corn and its seeds. Life is stronger than death.

This is the hope Easter brings. Christ was crucified and died on a cross. Yet he rose to a new and glorified life. Life really is stronger than death.


## MEN'S BREAKFAST
