### Why wear a Name Tag in Church?



"A person's name is the sweetest sound they will hear in any language. When you use their names, you will make them feel appreciated, welcome and important. People wear name tags more often than you think. The majority of retail establishments, stores and other social gatherings require name tags for several purposes. Sometimes it's for security. Other name tags are solely for identification. But simply stated, people wear name tags for one reason: so other people can us their names for friendlier, more personable service and conversation." *-Scott Ginsberg* 

Here are some reasons for you to wear a nametag at church:

	nametag is a permission slip that makes it okay to talk to someone you don't yet know.
	nametag is an invitation for friendliness.

\*\*Below is a recipe of the amazing green beans that were brought by a teacher from Edison Elementary on April 28th for our Fellowship Luncheon. So many of you requested the recipe, so we thought we would share it with everyone! Enjoy!\*\*



#### Old Fashioned Green Beans with Bacon & Brown Sugar

Prep Time: 15 minutes Yield: 10

Cook Time: 1 hour

5 (15 oz.) cans green beans; 10-12 slices of bacon; <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup brown sugar; <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup butter, melted; <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup soy sauce; 2 tsp minced garlic

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with foil, then spread out the bacon and bake it for 20 minutes or until crispy.

While the bacon is cooking, open and drain the green beans, then spread them out in a 9"x13" baking dish.

In a small bowl, whisk together the brown sugar, melted butter, soy sauce and minced garlic. Pour it over the green beans.

After the bacon is crispy, remove it from the oven, drain, and chop it. Spread it over the green beans. Reduce the oven temperature to 350 degrees F, then bake the beans for 40 minutes.

In 1879, Gainesville boasted a population of a little over 2600. Despite that low figure, excitement was growing amongst the business leaders. They knew something momentous was about to happen, an event destined to dramatically change Gainesville's future. That event was the arrival of the railroad, with the MK & T scheduled to chug into town later in the year and the Santa Fe posed to follow in the next few years. Railroads usually brought prosperity and a population surge to a community. Within a decade, Gainesville's population would soar to over 6500 people.

Just as business leaders were excited about the future so were church leaders.

Gainesville held out the promise of being a good place to launch a new church. Late in May or possibly early in June 1879 the Rev. H.L. Little, Synod missionary in Texas, rode into Gainesville to meet with a Rev. W.L. Miller. Together, they hoped to establish a new Presbyterian congregation in town.

On Friday, June 6, 1879 "in a room of the old Methodist church on Main Street, First Presbyterian Church was officially organized with nine charter members." Those nine members signed a charter and to function "as a Presbyterian congregation it was necessary for the church to elect one of the nine (Mr. Cunningham, presumably the only male of the nine) as the first elder and the Rev. Miller as the first pastor, serving for one year."

Thus, the First Presbyterian Church was launched with the prayers of nine people and the minister. Those prayers were fulfilled as the church grew and prospered. This year marks the 140<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the congregation in Gainesville. On June 9 as we celebrate Pentecost, we will also be celebrating 140 years of the church with a special meal. Please come and join in as we look back on our past and prepare for the future. This will help us know who is in worship with us on Sundays!




